DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The McCabe Mansion is a marble building of two and a half stories and five bays. Some of its elements suggest the Second Empire style, popular in America at the time this structure was built. The foremost element emphasizing this style is the mansard roof. Four central chimneys and five gabled dormers project from the roof and a parapet cornice decorates the roof line. The central bay, double, casement window of the second story is topped with an elliptically arched sunburst detail. The French double door of the projecting frontispiece has a round-arched detail of similar design. The remaining windows of the front facade are double hung, with 9/9 lights. First story windows and the decorated window of the second story have window baskets. The facade is greatly distorted by the addition of the four two-story columns of the front porch. The left wing of the building has also been added.

The McCabe Mansion fronts a busy commercial corridor, the York Road.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The first marble mansion to appear in Govans was erected at York Road and McCabe Avenue by Colonial Lawrence McCabe. McCabe, along with his brother, were builders of bridges and tunnels, the largest railroad and city contractors in Maryland. Among their vast number of accomplishments were the tunnel and bridge for the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad at St. Paul Street, the North Avenue Bridge built in the early 1890's, and a large part of New York's subway system. McCabe was also contracted to work on the Holland Tunnel in New York, a venture on which he lost a great deal of money. Unable to maintain his marble home, McCabe sold it to a harness maker named Harry Lerch and moved across the street to a little cottage. The mansion was later sold to another city contractor named Carozza and presently is the Seitz Funeral Home.

The mansion is a variation of the Second Empire style. It is built of marble which, it is said, was a surplus of the marble to be used in the construction of Baltimore's City Hall.

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
